The Great Green Goal appeal

PROJECT UPDATE: FOREST GOVERNANCE IN BURKINA FASO





Since 2007, Tree Aid has been working with communities across Burkina Faso to manage, protect, and use forests, known as our forest governance programme. Following the success of phase one, in 2019 we rolled out our work into more communities across the country.

Through this work, we are supporting people in rural areas to manage and protect trees and use them to earn an income. We are also supporting them to build waterconservina pits – known as boulis – to provide a stable source of water, all year round.

The objectives: Through this project, we are...

Over 70% of people in Burking Faso live rurally and rely on land and trees to get food to eat and products to sell for an income. But the effects of the climate crisis and deforestation mean land is rapidly losing its fertility. As a result, poverty and hunger are major issues here.

To make matters worse. communities that rely on the forests don't always know who is in charge of them. This means people are often unable to manage and protect forests in the way that they need.

Aly Diarra is a Project Officer for Tree Aid in Mali. A child of two teachers, he grew up in the village of Dogo in central Mali.

After completing his education, he became a shepherd for a while and worked in his family's fields.

A few facts about Aly

Aly's favourite food is tiontion, a dish from his local region consisting of fish and rice seasoned with sauce and hot oil. What he loves the most about his city is having a "few green spaces that allow for relaxation." Aly's favourite part of the day is going home to his family.

Working for Tree Aid

When Aly is in the field, a typical day looks like this: "I wake up at

5am, wash, say my prayers, have breakfast, check my email to respond to emergencies. I leave to do activities in villages around 8.30am to 9am and return to my base around 4pm. I wash and rest. After evening prayers, I check my email to respond to emergencies."

Some of these activities could be monitoring the progress of a nutrition garden or facilitating training on water conservation with project participants.



What projects is Aly working on?

Aly is working on two projects: 'Empowering 1,000 women in Mali through improved access to forests



and businesses' – also known as She Grows – and 'Promoting forest governance for resilient ecosystems and communities in Segou'.

The She Grows project – which has now been completed – was implemented in 10 villages and we are now doing the final evaluation.

Aly told us about challenges he faced on the *She Grows* project such as gender inequality: after seeing that women beekeepers were frowned upon in the community, Aly and the rest of

the team trained and sensitized men on gender so that they could understand that women can do the same activities that they do.

What are Aly's hopes for the future?

He hopes to expand the work in Mali and implement new projects which will help more communities, and he wishes for political stability and security.

A few facts about Mali:

- The capital of Mali is Bamako
- It is the 8th largest country in Africa
- There are many languages spoken, including French, Bambara, Dogon, Fulfulde and Arabic
- These are two famous sayings: "The forest comes because of the tree" and "Water is life."



Ghana has experienced severe land degradation. The environment there is difficult, the land is dry and infertile, making it difficult for people to grow food. As a result, Tree Aid is finding ways to adapt to these challenges, such as:

Grass briquettes

In Ghana, participants of a project supported by Ecosia have been learning to make grass briquettes. These are made by clearing dried grass that grows around the base of trees, threatening wildfires.



These super bricks are fuel efficient, cleaner than wood burning and help to protect trees from fire.

Communities have found that two small briquettes are enough to cook a meal. They can either sell the briquettes or use them in their homes.

How grass briquettes are made:

- 1. Gather the grass
- 2. Dry it
- 3. Burn it slowly in a barrel
- 4. Mix it with a natural adhesive
- 5. Squash it into moulds
- 6. You have a grass briquette!



Mud walls

Mud walls are used to protect tree saplings. The traditional way of making a mud wall takes 3 days. It is labour intensive and leads to inconsistent results, which can sometimes lead to mud walls collapsing under heavy rain.

Tree Aid has been working with communities on the Bongo Reforestation Project in Ghana to use a new and improved method of making a mud wall using a mould. This process is much quicker – under an hour – and means that the mud walls are all standardised and can withstand the environment.



Vetiver grass planting

Vetiver is a grass commonly used in Ghana for weaving baskets and hats, amongst other things. But vetiver also has a superpower: with its long roots, this drought-resistant plant can be used to reduce soil erosion and restore degraded land.

As part of the Bongo Reforestation Project in Ghana, we have been working alongside communities to plant vetiver along a dam wall to help catch some of the water runoff and absorb it into the soil.
